




Lizzie Monaghan, the future Sister M. Chrysostom, was born in Montreal, Canada, in 1867. The archives does not have a record of when or why she arrived in the USA or of her life prior to her



entrance into the OLM Community on December 3, 1892. She was received on July 15, 1893 and professed on August 15, 1895. Following her profession Sr. Chrysostom spent several years working in the parochial schools in Charleston. However, on August 6, 1908 she was assigned to St. Joseph's Academy, Sumter, SC, where she remained through 1916. She is credited with establishing and

teaching in the Commercial Department of St. Joseph's during her eight years there. In September 1917 she was transferred to St. Francis Xavier Hospital, Charleston, where she provided secretarial assistance for the next four years. On September 6, 1921 Sr. Chrysostom was assigned to the City Orphanage on Queen Street where she served as teacher and friend of the orphans as well as teaching in St. Joseph's

Parochial School. Sister Chrysostom died in St. Francis Xavier Hospital on November 5, 1925. Her obituary stated, "Until two weeks before her death, she held to her task of leading the little ones to the Savior. While the bleak winds of November wail around us let us pray that her greeting from the Master was: Well done, good and faithful servant; enter thou into the joy of thy Lord." She is buried in St. Lawrence Cemetery, Charleston.




<u>Sister Isidore</u>, the former Elizabeth Sowers, was born on September 21, 1869 in Greenville, SC. Later her parents, John Sidney and Amanda Sowers, moved the family to Salisbury, NC. Here Elizabeth was taught her religion by the famous Catholic writer, Christian Reid, to whom she

always felt deeply indebted. Following a move to Columbia, SC, Elizabeth, her parents, and several siblings were received into the Catholic Church. On February 1, 1901, Elizabeth entered the OLM Community in Charleston, SC. At her reception she became Sister Isidore and was professed on October 20, 1902. The first twenty-one years of her religious life were spent in Saint Joseph Academy, Sumter, SC. Here she endeared herself to her students by her unselfish labors in their behalf, particularly in the fields of music and art. During this period of her religious life, she attended the Summer Sessions of the Catholic University, Washington, DC. Sister Isidore was elected and served as General Secretary and Treasurer of the OLM Community from 1926 to 1929. In September 1929 she was appointed Director of the City Orphanage Asylum which the OLM Community operated. Three years later, in September 1932, Sister Isidore was assigned to assist Sister M. Evangelist with the welfare work at the Neighborhood House in Charleston.



However, she was forced to relinquish this post after a few weeks on account of sickness. She then became a patient at St. Francis Xavier Hospital in Charleston where she remained until her death on November 24, 1933. Her obituary stated, "Sister Isidore was gentle and retiring, but she was an

indefatigable worker. Her truly Christian principles and boundless charity was a source of edification to all who came in contact with her." Sister Isidore is buried in St. Lawrence

Cemetery, Charleston.
